

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

Nice VG+ jacket with just a bit of edge wear. An interesting account of a woman who ran a farm in Great Britain during World War Two. With chapters covering women on the farm, her employment of German prisoners of war, agricultural difficulties, her strained relationship with the British military police, which she dubs the British Gestapo, the government's impressment of her fields for troop and tank training, etc. With black & white photo illustrations. An uncommon book.

5. Brown, Wm. Wells. Sketches of Places and People Abroad...with a Memoir of the Author. Boston & Cleveland: John P. Jewett and Company and Jewett, Proctor & Worthington, 1855. First edition. 7.25" x 4.5". 320pp. Brown cloth with gilt spine lettering. Corners and spine tips a little worn, light foxing to a few leaves, an old pencil ownership inscription, 1/4" margin chips to the first three leaves. Still, a better than average example of a scarce and important book. With an engraved frontis portrait of Brown. Brown was a prominent African - American abolitionist lecturer, novelist, playwright, and historian. Born into slavery in Montgomery County, Kentucky, Brown escaped to Ohio in 1834 at the age of 20. He settled in Boston, where he worked for abolitionist causes and became a prolific writer. Amongst working for abolitionist causes, Brown also supported temperance, women's suffrage, pacifism, prison reform, and anti-tobacconism. His novel Clotel (1853), considered the first novel written by an African American, was published in London, where he resided at the time; it was later published in the United States. This book is considered the 'earliest

African American travelogue'.

- 6. Child, Mrs. [Lydia Maria]. An Appeal of That Class of Americans Called Africans. Boston: Allen and Ticknor, 1833. First edition. 7.25" x 4.5". 232pp. Original purple cloth with a printed paper spine label. With the errata slip. The binding is slightly cocked, spine tips and corners a bit rubbed, label a bit rubbed. With the errata slip tipped in. A sound copy of a scarce and important book. "In 1833 Child was probably the best known woman writer in America. She was the author of popular novels like Hobomok (1823) and a best-selling advice manual called The Frugal Housewife (1829), and founder of the nation's first children's magazine, The Juvenile Miscellany. But as she predicted in the preface to this protest against slavery and racism, this book made her very unpopular with many former admirers and readers. It is one of the first major American abolitionist texts, and in its arguments in favor of admitting African Americans into full membership in society, one of the most radical." Fine condition. With color illustrations by Herbert Temple. Ths very uncommon children's book is an allegorical tale of Africa's struggle against the ravishment of its people, countries and natural resources. This book won the Coretta Scott King award in 1975.
- 8. ["Wild Bill" Donovan] Laughlin, J. Laurence. The Federal Reserve Act. Its Origins and Problems. New York: The Macmillan Company, 1933. First edition. 9.25" x 6.25". 400pp. Brown cloth with gilt lettering. Spine a little dull, else nice VG+ condition. A study of the landmark American economic legislation. With much on the W.J. Bryan silver campaign,

bank notes, the Aldrich Bill, the National Citizens' League, the Glass Bill, Woodrow Wilson, inflation and deflation, depression and recovery, credit, and more.

This copy bears the ownership signature of William J. [Joseph] Donovan. "Wild Bill" Donovan was an American soldier, lawyer, intelligence officer and diplomat. He is best remembered as the wartime head of the Office of Strategic Services (OSS), the precursor to the Central Intelligence Agency, during World War II. He is also known as the "Father of American Intelligence" and the "Father of Central Intelligence". The CIA regards Donovan as its founding father, according to journalist Evan Thomas in a 2011 Vanity Fair profile. In the article Thomas observed that Donovan's "exploits are utterly improbable but by now well documented in declassified wartime records that portray a brave, noble, headlong, gleeful, sometimes outrageous pursuit of action and skullduggery."

A decorated veteran of World War I, Donovan is the only person to have received all four of the United States' highest awards: The Medal of Honor, the Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, and the National Security Medal. He was also a recipient of the Silver Star and Purple Heart, as well as decorations from a number of other nations for his service during both World Wars.

Donovan's autograph is fairly uncommon in commerce. With excellent provenence; purchased from a member of Donovan's family. \$75.00

Black leather spine and corners, brown cloth with gilt lettering. Binding soiled and worn, soiling to front and rear endpapers, large chips on the two rear blank leaves. Generally Good + / VG- condition. With an engraved frontis of an African American cook, and interesting advertisements at the rear of the book. This very scarce book is among the first separately published works, if not THE first, on Creole cookery. With many recipes. Lafcadio Hearn's *La Cuisine Creole* is generally regarded as the first book on creole cuisine; it was published the same year as this volume. \$2,250.00

9b. Hines, Duncan. Duncan Hines Food Odyssey. NY: Crowell, (1955). First edition. Fine condition in a near fine dust jacket. **Signed** by Duncan Hines on the dedication leaf. The chatty and very engaging autobiography of this key figure in the history of American food culture.

What would American food and travel be like if it were not for the pioneering efforts and research of Duncan Hines? He was a middle-aged traveling salesman when he began to collect information about the hundreds of diners, cafes and restaurants where he ate while on the road. In the early 1930s his first little newsletters were sent out to friends, who knew Duncan Hines was their "go to" guy for information about American restaurants and hotels. At age 55, Hines quit his sales job and went into the guide business full time. Within a few years, the Duncan Hines guides to restaurants and hotels became the gold standard by which such establishments were rated. If your cafe or motel was good enough for Hines to list,

your success was almost guaranteed. Despite many overtures, Hines refused to take any kind of advertising or accept any kind of gifts from anyone in the hospitality business...the only way anyone could make it into the guides was on merit.

He was also a stickler for cleanliness and sanitation...at one time, eating on the road here in the US was a real crap shoot, and food poisoning and other ailments were par for the course. Early on Hines established a rule...if a restaurant would not let him into the kitchen to see the conditions, then they would not be listed in the guide.

It's hard to overestimate the importance of Hines in the development of the American restaurant and travel industries...these days, we have dozens of "on line" rating sites, AAA, Mobil Travel Guide, etc., but back in the 30s through the 60s, Hines was the gold standard for honesty and accuracy, and nothing since then has improved upon his personal formula.





Stapled wraps. 8pp. The Far East Cafe is still going strong at the same address, 631 Grant Avenue, where it has been located since 1920. This early 40s menu doesn't have very many unusual dishes but it should be noted that half the text is in Chinese only, and there may be some more interesting items which we can't detect!

The drink list inside the front cover has all the usual mixed drinks including Chinese restaurant faves like the "Oriental Lady" and the Singapore Sling, but they also offered at least three Chinese liqueurs.

12. [Food & Cookery – Restaurant Menus] *Joy Hong Low Restaurant.* 8 Tyler Street. Boston, Mass. 8.5" x 11". Single fold. Printed on glazed stock. Circa 1940. Attractive menu from this long-lived Chinatown institution. VG+ condition. Joy Hong Low was one of several popular Chinese restaurants on Tyler Street, and was founded by the same family who supposedly opened Boston's first Chinese restaurant in 1879. A good variety of standard Chinese dishes with the addition of fresh lobster to the formula. The restaurant is long gone, and the Tyler Street location now is home to a tea shop, a frozen yogurt seller and an Asian book store.



13. [Food & Cookery – Restaurant Menus] *Punch & Judy Ice Cream Parlors*. Southern California, various locations. Circa 1948. 12" x 6'5". Single fold, on card stock. Crazy and elaborate ice cream concoctions including one gigantic jumble called a "Moron's Ecstasy" which would have set you back a dollar...the most expensive item on the menu!

The Punch & Judy chain in greater Los Angeles was opened right after WW2 by the legendary Art Whizin (1906 - 1994), an imaginative and colorful entrepreneur who owned and operated some 20 Chili Bowl cafes in greater LA, opening the first one in 1931 with a stake of \$1200...which he had raised by selling his car and his wife's wedding ring.


The Chili Bowl restaurants were very popular and had a most distinctive appearance...they were all built in the shape of a giant chili bowl...not so odd given the popularity in the 30s of such vernacular designs.

After the war, Whizin decided to change direction and closed all the Chili Bowls, but converted a few of them into the deluxe Punch & Judy ice cream shops. The round chili bowls were fairly easy to rehab and turn into colorful ice cream bowls, complete with Punch & Judy decorations.


We have not been able to track down when the last of the Punch & Judys shops closed, but it was probably in the late 1950s.

Happily, four of the original Chili Bowl buildings are still standing...three still contain food related businesses but the fourth has become the office for used car lot in Glendale.

Beer and wine are also offered, which places it post-Repeal but not by much. This menu features low prices and oddly old-fashioned graphics. The location is now home to an Asian grocery store called The Shanghai Bazaar. \$50.00

The title page is particularly nice. A philosophical treatise by the American ichthyologist, educator, eugenicist, and peace activist. He was president of Indiana University and was the founding president of Stanford University. \$30.00

He led the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia, and became a leader of the Civil Rights Movement, as the head of the NAACP chapter in Atlanta and of the Civic and Political League. He also encouraged his son to become active in the movement.

Limited edition, one of only 225 numbered copies each **signed** by the author. This copy was Bradford Morrow's copy, with his ownership signature. Morrow was the co-author of the Lewis bibliography published by Black Sparrow in 1978. \$100.00

With affection and respect, Hubert, 7 August 1981." Locke (b. 1934) is a retired professor and Dean Emeritus of the Daniel J. Evans School of Public Affairs at the University of Washington. He is a moral leader, an author, a Holocaust scholar, and an authority on police and urban affairs. The July 9, 1995 *Seattle Times* described him as "a sort of civic-wise-man-in-residence, counseling patience and understanding in politicians and offering a voice of reason on contentious issues from race relations to growth management".



29. Somerville, Dr. J. Alexander. *Man of Color. An Autobiography by Dr. J. Alexander Somerville.* Los Angeles: Lorrin L. Morrison, Printing and Publishing, (1949). First edition. 9" x 6". 170pp. Blue cloth. Somerville was a Jamaican emigrant, and was the first black graduate of the University of Southern California School of Dentistry. In 1914, only three years after its founding in New York City, the Los Angeles branch of the NAACP was created at the home of John and Vada Somerville. His first major business venture, the Somerville Hotel, was a principal African American enterprise on Central Avenue, in the heart of the Los Angeles African American community. When it opened in 1928 it was one of the most upscale black hotels in the United States, and counted a number of African American celebrities among its guests. In addition to developing other properties in the Los Angeles area, throughout the years Somerville and his wife were active in community affairs and civil rights work. In addition to being the second African American on the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, he served on the Police Commission from 1949 to 1953. In 1953 he was named Officer of the Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II.

- 32. Williams, Robert F. Edited by Marc Schleifer. *Negroes With Guns*. New York: Marzani & Munsell, Inc., 1962. First edition. 8" x 5". 128pp. Black coth, in dust wrapper. Fine condition. The jacket has a little edge wear and rubbing. The author served in the U.S. Marine Corps, and later became president of the Monroe, North Carolina chapter of the NAACP. At a time of high racial tension and official abuses, Williams promoted armed black self defense in the United States. This influential book details his experience with violent racism and his disagreement with the non violent wing of the Civil Rights Movement. Black Panther Party founder Huey Newton cited this book as a major inspiration.
